

Full-time CS Coordinators provide programming, interventions, and resources to meet the needs of the students, their families, teachers and school administrators.



Success Story

Amy* was new to Red Bank High School and was failing most of her classes. She had experienced trauma, having her brother and friend die within months of each other. The extra homework time in afternoons, emotional support from Mr. Love, and connection to a math tutor helped her raise all of her grades to passing. She's now part of the Red Bank Mentor Program.

Success Story

David*, a disabled veteran, was living in his car until his dad was able to help him move into a stable housing situation. David got a job but didn't get paid in time to keep up with his rent. After working through a budget and receiving rent assistance from the NNH, David was able to pay his rent each month.

Operating as a Coffee Shop, the Coffee Community Collective offers free space to community organizations seeking a place to host meetings, trainings, or community gatherings. We also partner with organizations like Helen Ross McNabb Center, Consumer Credit Counseling Services, and the Office for Family Empowerment to bring much-needed resources to our neighbors living north of the river.

Success Story

When Chattanooga State classes shifted to online in 2020, a young man started coming to the C3 for free internet access to attend classes and do his schoolwork. He continued to use the space through 2021, when he graduated with his degree. He was very grateful for the connectivity provided by C3.


