


Good Neighbor Fund 2023



COMMUNITY SCHOOLS

Centering on the local school, the Northside Neighborhood House CommUNITY School (CS) model provides wrap-around supports to meet the physical, social, and emotional needs of the school community. Full-time CS Coordinators provide programming to offer a range of support services and opportunities to children, families, and communities. From one-on-one support throughout the day to dedicated homework time, snack time and varied afterschool activities, students value the relationships fostered through the programming.

IMPACT STORY

When a family lost everything in a house fire, our Hixson Middle CS Coordinator immediately got involved. She connected them to the CS afterschool and NNH Stability programs, where they were able to get food, school supplies, and clothes, as well as gas cards and housing assistance. Through this relationship, the coordinator was able to help them feel supported as they took their next steps.

IMPACT STORY

Due to her husband's deteriorating condition in the hospital, a client arrived for her appointment but could only manage a partial visit. She rescheduled and completed the appointment from the ICU waiting area. Their mortgage had already received hardship forbearance and modification. The husband came home with severe organ damage and an inability to work after spending 8 weeks in the ICU. Despite efforts from hospital staff, disability pay was still in the appeal process. The wife can't work due to caregiving responsibilities and limited technology skills. In this extremely difficult period, the Northside Neighborhood House stepped in to cover the family's mortgage and establish a lasting connection with them, aiming to provide during this tough time.

COFFEE COMMUNITY COLLECTIVE

At the Coffee Community Collective (C3) we offer support and serve great coffee! C3 was created as a means to remove barriers for people living across northern Hamilton County. In a culture where it is difficult to ask for help, a coffee shop offers a safe and comfortable environment for our neighbors to enter, share their stories, and receive the help they need. The shop also offers free space to community organizations seeking a

place to hope meetings, trainings, or

community gatherings.



IMPACT STORY

We had a neighbor walk into the Coffee Community Collective and request assistance with getting a job. She was newly unemployed and also newly pregnant. One of our case managers sat with her to look at jobs and help her create an Indeed account. She then proceeded to tell him that since all this had happened in her life, she hadn't had anyone who was willing to just sit and listen to her, let alone help her get over the hurdles of applying for a job. The Case Manager shared that bridging gaps was a part of the NNH mission and that if she needed any other help, she could come in again. A couple of weeks later, she came in looking for other support, while dressed in her new job's uniform. We were able to cheer her on and connect her with further wrap-around supports as she works toward stability.










THRIFT STORES


IMPACT STORY

A CommUNITY School Coordinator referred one of his student's family to us. When they sat down with our case manager to look at their budget, it became apparent that the expense of the laundromat with a family of her size was taking a huge portion of money from her very limited budget. Through partnering with our thrift store in Red Bank, we were able to give this single mother a washer and dryer, putting precious money back into her budget to care for her family.









REVENUE & EXPENSES

We envision a thriving community working together to facilitate cross-generational stability, empowerment, and elimination of barriers for our neighbors.

The following are accomplishments to date and future goals for the initiatives that were part of the Vision for 2026 created by the NNH Board and Leadership team.

Strategic Initiatives:

Client-Centered Service Model

✓ Restructured monthly Stability team meetings to reflect on trends around barriers and brainstorm new possible partnerships.

- BetterFi started working out of C3 to work with neighbors on debt management.
- Develop text message update program to increase neighbor's ability to provide feedback on supports provided and to promote programming.

Housing

- Hosted landlord listening sessions
- Starting Good Tenant Workshops in collaboration with THDA and Consumer Credit Counseling of Chattanooga and the TN River Valley.
- Continuing to research housing programs across the southeast.

Building Social Capital

✓ Started new mentor group at Soddy Daisy Middle in the 22-23 school year focused on young men and skill building. Expanded from five to ten schools allowing more students to be connected to career and hobby exploration opportunities.

Community Impact Strategist

- Streamlined data collection processes across programs.
- ✔ Created two whitepapers that can be found on the NNH website on Affordable Housing and Living Wages.
- Continue working with the Community Advisory Board to gain feedback on barriers and strategies to remove them using lived experiences.

Alternative Revenue Models

- ✓ Launched Good Neighbor, NNH's online e-commerce site.
- Continue to grow monthly giving engagement. Develop more intentional planned gift program.
